Class 3: Elliot for his writing and Lola for excellent science work


Class 4: Mally for excellent maths work at home and Jack for writing an adventure story





Time	Plan of Work	Quality and safety checks
9.55am	Wash hands	Make surface is clean.
10.00am	Wash and peel the leeks and potatoes	Boil water for stock
10.10am	Chop veg into small chunks Make stock	And stock cube to 500ml of boiling water
10.20am	Place Veg in saucepan and add the stock	Make sure hob is turned off.
10.30am	Heat the stock and veg till boiling	Turn down the heat ans simmer for 30mins or veg is soft.
10.40am	Set oven to gas mark6 / 200c	
10.42am	Sieve the flour baking powder & Cayenne powder together in mixing bowl.	
10.50am	Stir in dry herbs	
10.52am	Add in the butter	Rub butter into mix until it looks like breadcrumbs
10.55am	Stir Mixture together and 3/4of the cheese And put aWell in mixture and add milk.	Use wooden spoon till it looks like dough.



Life in the School Buildings

Life in school has continued in a reduced capacity for the children of Key Workers, alongside a skeleton staff. Despite the school being exceptionally quiet, the children have worked on a range of different projects and have taken time each day to undertake online learning activities like the children at home. We have also been taking part in Joe Wicks' daily PE sessions. Here are some examples of what has been going on:

Monday: The children produced some paintings using masking tape to create different shapes on the paper. They also tried this technique on a giant chalk board. **Tuesday:** Today's group helped to plant a new weaved willow hedge around the forest school area. The children also planted sunflower seeds to take home and look after. **Wednesday:** The children produced rainbows using their fingerprints, used the trim trail, had choosing time and then wrote about their days.

Thursday: The children did a spring garden investigation on Gruffland, produced a collaborative blossom tree, using tissue paper, wrote diaries and listened to a story. **Friday:** Today the children have been on a bear hunt around the school, worked on some collaborative artwork, used the trim-trail and planted some beans outside.

All About the Human Skeleton



The largest bone is called the femur and the smallest bone is called the ossicles there are 231 bones in children and 206 in adults. Calcium is inportant in making bones grow and in keeping them strong. Calcium can be found in foods and drink, especilly in leafy greens such as brocall and cabbage, also in daily foods such as cheese and milk, these are an in portant part in a healthy det.

The skeleton provides suport, protection and the meens for movement. If humans didn't have bones people would be a blob like stuctur.

Where two bones meet is calld a joint. Joint make the skeleton flexible-without them movement would be inpossible. Muscles are also needed for movement. Muscles are madeup of tough, elastic tissue that pulls on bones in orderto make them move.

There are different types of joints such as:Fingers,Toes, Ball, Soket, Hip, Sholder, Pivot and Gliding




